system push-back with respect to system-wide literacy/numeracy assessments, structuring of Language Arts curriculum, lack of clarity regarding Career Ed course, absence of mandatory Aboriginal Ed course and failure to align K-9 reporting with 10-12 reporting.

Superintendent's Report January 8, 2019

School Closure/Dismissal for Inclement Weather

Recent spate of weather – in particular power outages and compromised roads – serves as an opportunity to remind everyone of how schools respond to severe, unexpected weather that impacts on school operations. We're quite familiar with what happens when schools close for the entire day but less familiar with what happens when things happen *after* school is already in session.

For example, the extreme weather and power outages prior to winter break gave many people reason to think we'd close schools during the day and send students home prior to weather worsening. It's not as easy as it seems on paper, as dismissing school early impacts on established family expectations and routines, and is unlikely to successfully reunite all students and families prior to the end of a normal school day. In short, it is far easier, less chaotic and often safer to accommodate students through to the end of a normal school day than it is to have an early dismissal. This is especially the case when the impact of extreme weather is not universal across the community.

We have successfully dismissed early but usually in extreme cases when other systems and organizations are also closing operations for the day and families are both expecting and prepared to accommodate an early dismissal. Unless we have a clear indication that conditions will worsen or cannot be rectified, though, we stay in session and try to follow normal routines as best as possible.
