## Superintendent's Report April 9, 2019

### **SD70 Awarded MCFD Contract for Regional Early Years Services**

Early years services in British Columbia are delivered entirely through contracted organizations, who aim to respond to families' unique needs and act as strong advocates for families and children. Early years services work to help connect families to the services they need, provide them with effective social supports and networks, in order to support the wellness of both children and families.

Over the past 15 years, the BC government has investigated ways to build local capacity, and give recognition to early years' tables across the province who have participated throughout this process as community champions to create strong networks to share information, leverage relationships, development and implement programs, and raise awareness of the importance of the early years.

MCFD has announced that it is shifting its investment, currently allocated to community planning in Success by 6 and Children's First initiatives, into more direct programming in communities. The function of early years' planning will be assumed by new positions in regional MCFD offices, with service delivery contracted to providers in each of the 13 Service Delivery Areas within the province. School District 70 (Alberni) was the successful applicant to provide early years services in our region.

The Early Years Services Framework outlines the direct service categories that will guide service delivery. Direct services for families with young children include those that support and promote community belonging to address social isolation, supports to families experiencing vulnerabilities, supports to access Indigenous culture and language, support to families to navigate the system of supports and make the direct connections they need and supports children to engage in early years programs. <a href="Early Years Service Framework"><u>Early Years Service Framework (PDF)</u></a>

For SD70, this means that the Alberni Valley Early Years Centre will shift its focus to include not only Port Alberni but also communities on the west coast. Early years staff will continue with many pre-existing programs and partnerships to support children and families, and will assume greater responsibility for service delivery categories noted above.
