Background

Boards of Education are required to file an Amended Annual Budget by the end of February 2026.

Information

While our 1701 submission, containing September 29, 2025 school enrolment data, is only at the draft stage, Staff have made some preliminary calculations to determine the impact on the operating grants.

The attached analysis shows that the financial impact of this enrolment change will result in:

- An increase of \$1,250,610 in September Enrolment-Based Funding;
- An increase of \$672,577 in the Supplement for Unique Student Needs;
- An increase of \$27,129 in the Supplement for Salary Differential;
- A decrease of \$386,615 for the Supplement for Enrolment Decline;
- A decrease of \$1,126 for the Curriculum & Learning Support Grant;

with an overall increase of \$1,562,575. There is no change to our projections for the Februray and May enrolment counts.

These calculations will be confirmed when the Ministry releases the updated operating Grants in mid-December. A copy of their most recent estimate, based on our February 2025 enrolment projections, is attached for your review. This is the basis of the Preliminary Budget under which we are currently operating.

Other information to consider:

- This month, we will be submitting our EDAS report (Employment Data Analysis System), which will be used to determine the average teacher salary in each district. This amount is used to calculate the Supplement for the Salary Differential, which shows in the bottom left section of the funding announcement.
- Enrolments for February and May recounts will remain unknown.

Staff will continue to work on budgets for staffing and supplies and services in all areas, as well as capital and special purpose fund budgets. At this stage, we can confirm the following Full Time Equivalent (FTE) in positions throughout the year:

Subject: 2025-26 School Budgets

Background

Districts are required to report, annually, on enrolment as at the final day of September. Based on this year's 1701 data, the Ministry will update the Operating Grants for 2025/26 "the block". These funding annuancements are expected in mid-December. The formula used by the school district to develop school budgets is tied to enrolment.

Information

Factors used to calculate school budgets include:

- # of FTE Principals, Vice Principals and Teachers
- Headcount and FTE of students included in the 1701 count
- Headcount and FTE of International Program Students

In the previous year (2024-2025) the District advised schools that surplus funds targeted to Indigenous Education would return as a surplus to the Indigenous Education Program and any remaining surplus would carry over at a 90% District / 10% School ratio. Schools carrying over a deficit would retain 100% of that deficit.

For 2025-26, pending approval from the Indigenous Education Council on the targeted dollar portion, the District will distribute funds based on the same ratio with a 20% holdback.

Staff will be prepared to answer any questions Trustees have during the meeting.

Subject: Update – MoECC Ministerial Order – Unexpected Health Emergencies

Background:

Ministerial Order on Unexpected Health Emergencies Implementation

On July 28, 2025, a <u>letter</u> was distributed to all Public School Superintendents providing additional guidance and resources related to the recent amendment to the <u>Support Services for Schools Ministerial Order</u> and the new <u>Response to Unexpected Health Emergencies Policy</u>, which came into effect on July 1, 2025.

The letter outlines the following key implementation timelines:

- **Policy Submission** All boards of education must submit their completed policies to the Ministry by December 31, 2025.
- **Secondary Schools** Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) and naloxone must be in all secondary schools by December 31, 2025.
- **Elementary and Middle Schools** AEDs and naloxone must be in all elementary and middle schools by September 8, 2026.

The letter also includes guidance on procurement and training opportunities to support the implementation of AEDs and naloxone in schools and clarifies that an Administrative Procedure meets the requirements for policy submission.

Actions:

Naloxone:

- Pacific Rim School District has drafted a new Policy titled XXX Response to Unexpected Health Emergencies" and two accompanying Administrative Procedures titled: XXXX Opioid Overdose Response and XXXX Automated External Defibrillator (AED).
- The drafted Policy and Administrative Procedures were presented at the Oct 7th Policy Committee. The draft policy was approved and moved to Public Consultation. The Administrative Procedures are waiting for the policy approval process to move from

- draft to approval. The Ministry of Education has placed deadlines for completion and implementation (above).
- Two staff members have been identified at each secondary school site (School Administrator and First Aid Attendant) and will receive training by the district's Manager of Youth Outreach, who has certified trainer status for Naloxone.
- Currently, every school site has two current Naloxone injectable kits for use. All School
 Principals were trained two years ago. Training refreshers are currently happening for
 this staff group. First Aid Attendant training in Secondary schools is being planned for
 Nov/early Dec.
- Elementary training will be planned in early 2026.

AED:

- Both ADSS and USS secondary school sites are equipped with AED's
- AEDS for both EALC and Board Office have been ordered. Once they arrive, installation will be scheduled. The priority is EALC to meet MoECC requirements.

The day featured powerful presentations and cultural moments that honoured Indigenous voices and highlighted resilience.

A special thanks to Tseshaht First Nation's Cultural Support, Aaron Watts, whose moving performance united attendees through song, reminding us of the strength and healing in cultural expression.





USS HOSTS LEGACY OF HOPE EXHIBIT

This September, Ucluelet Secondary School partnered for the fifth year with the Clayoquot Biosphere Trust and the Legacy of Hope Foundation to bring a museum-quality exhibit into the school. The display served as a central piece for learning about the legacy of residential schools, and the impact their existence had on Indigenous families and their language and culture as a whole.

Student showcases and visits from Knowledge Keepers deepened engagement, while the USS Mental Health Team and external supports helped ensure student and staff well-being throughout the month.

On September 26th, Wood School held a powerful and reflective Truth and Reconciliation assembly, bringing students and staff together to honour the survivors of residential schools and remember those who never made it home.


REACHING OUT FOR HELP

SCHOOL MEAL PROGRAM 2025-2026: EVERYONE BELONGS AT THE TABLE

Welcome back to another year of learning, growth, and connection. School food continues to be a key source of support for our students, and the 2024–2025 school year brought several meaningful milestones both locally and nationally.

2024-2025 HIGHLIGHTS:

- The <u>National School Food Program</u> launched, complementing B.C.'s Feeding Futures to reduce hunger and support learning.
- <u>Feeding Futures</u> funding continued, helping schools meet rising food costs with local solutions.
- We had a successful first year partnering with Nourish <u>Cowichan</u>, who provided daily meals to students in Port Alberni and Ucluelet with the support of local staff. Existing partnerships continued with our valued contractors at <u>Bamfield Community School Association</u> and <u>Wickaninnish PAC</u>.
- Student participation rose by 10%, with over 21% accessing school meals.
- Kitchen upgrades at EJ Dunn and Wickaninnish boosted food prep capacity and variety.
- Staff, volunteer, and donor support remains key to the program's success.

UPCOMING IN 2025-2026

- We're building on last years' success by expanding menu options, strengthening school-community connections, and ensuring every student can access meals when needed.
- Across the district we are continuing our partnership with our existing meal providers, and exploring additional community collaborations.
- With provincial Food Infrastructure Program funding, schools are replacing older fridges and freezers with energy-efficient commercial appliances. This provides more space, safer storage, fewer deliveries, and fewer appliances plugged in — making the program both sustainable and environmentally responsible.

CELEBRATING OUR FOOD STAFF

On Monday, September 29th, our entire school food team came together to reflect on the past year and share ideas for the future. This gathering highlighted not just the scale of the program, but the people who make it happen every day—from cooking and packing to delivering and serving.

SETTING YOUR LEARNER UP FOR LITERACY SUCCESS


Parents/guardians have an important role in helping their children become readers and writers. Engagement with literacy at home can help set children on the right path for success at school.

Children benefit from parents/guardians working in collaboration with schools to support the development of literacy skills. Reach out to your child's teacher to see what you can do at home to best support your child's literacy development. Help your child consistently complete any home reading or daily reading homework that may be sent home by their teacher.

Have your child read for a minimum of 20 minutes daily at home. This practice alone can lead to greater literacy and overall school success. You can have your child read aloud to a family member or you can read to them. Talk about what you are reading, share your thoughts and feelings and discuss the meaning of new or unfamiliar words.

NUMERACY AND MATH HIGHLIGHT

Many schools throughout our district are exploring different ways to engage students in numeracy and math concepts.

One successful approach that teachers are using involves the integration of games and workshop-style activities. Math workshops are inclusive practices that allow all students to learn at their individual levels. They also provide students with options for activities, ways to represent their learning, and materials they can use to showcase their knowledge. Math stations give children the chance to practice foundational skills, build fact fluency, and collaborate with their peers. Additionally, students have time to work in small groups with their teacher, focusing on strategies, computation, or concepts within their number range.



My name is Michelle Colyn. I am from the Somass (Port Alberni) area. My father is Boyd Gallic, my mother is Valerie Gallic. I am a Tseshaht woman and also have ties to Hupacasath and Ditidaht. My grandmother is Marian Gallic and my grandfather is Richard Gallic mit. I have two kids and work at Pacific Rim School District 70.

Born and raised in Port Alberni, I am grateful to be joining the school district as the Manager of Indigenous Language and Culture.

I hold a Bachelor of Arts in Sociology and Media Studies (2012) and began my career with the Nuu-chah-nulth Tribal Council in the Fisheries department, Uu-a-thluk, supporting capacity building with all 14 nuučaańuł Nations. In 2019, I stepped back from work to focus on raising my family, and from 2021 to 2025 I worked part-time with my Nation, Tseshaht, supporting Membership Administration. Now, with my two children in school, I'm excited to return to full-time work in this meaningful role.

The priorities I'll be focusing on in this role include:

- Conducting a feasibility study of implementing various levels of Indigenous Language Programming in the public schools.
- Establishing an Art Cataloging system to respectfully display, maintain, and track cultural art pieces across the District.
- Creating learning opportunities for staff and learners that strengthen language, cultural competency, and cultural safety.

This position offers an opportunity to help advance the District's goals while aligning with our Nation's Strategic Plans, the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Calls to Action, the BC First Peoples Principles of Learning, and BC's Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act. I am so honored to take on this role and commit to carrying it out with care and respect.





EMPLOYEE SHOWCASE

We caught up with 3 of our West Coast bus drivers to ask them three questions.

- What has been the highlight of your first week and a half?
- What do you like about starting to work with Pacific Rim School District?
- What do you like about being a Bus Driver?

NEW MÉTIS CHILDCARE FACILITY

A major milestone is underway at Maquinna Elementary with the near completion of a new 34-space childcare centre, created through a partnership between Métis Nation BC, Alberni-Clayoquot Métis Society, and the Pacific Rim School District. More than just a building, this project reflects a shared vision to honour Métis and Nuu-chah-nulth ways of being while supporting children, families, and community.

Before construction began, a groundbreaking ceremony was held in January to begin this work in a good way. Led with the guidance of Aaron Watts from Tseshaht First Nation and in partnership with Métis Nation BC and Alberni-Clayoquot Métis Society, the ceremony followed local cultural protocols—acknowledging Mother Earth, giving thanks to the land, and welcoming ancestors and future generations into the space.

The gathering was attended by Elected Chief Councillor waamiiš (Ken Watts) of Tseshaht First Nation, Elected Chief Councilor ?u ma qak taktla (Brandy Lauder) of Huupačas?atḥ First Nation, and several ḥawiłth (hereditary Chiefs), along with representatives from Métis Nation BC, Alberni-Clayoquot Métis Society, and the Pacific Rim School District. Their presence and shared words brought depth, respect, and cultural strength to the event. It was a moving and grounding moment for all present, marking not only the physical beginning of construction but the spiritual beginning of a place built on relationship, respect, and shared purpose. Deep gratitude is extended to Aaron for his cultural guidance and care in helping ensure the ceremony was carried out with meaning, intention, and respect.

Located on the traditional, ancestral, and unceded territories of the Tseshaht and Huupačas?atḥ First Nations, the centre will provide culturally rooted early learning opportunities that celebrate identity and belonging. Through this partnership, families will benefit not only from accessible, affordable childcare, but also from connections to Elders, Knowledge Holders, and culturally grounded resources.

The modular building is expected to be fully complete by December. Métis Nation BC and the District are currently seeking a non-profit childcare operator to run the program. Once selected, the operator will move through the provincial licensing process before the centre officially opens.

Priority spaces will be available for self-identified Métis families, families from local land-based Nations, and urban Indigenous families, while remaining spaces will be available to the wider community. Families interested in childcare are encouraged to join the interest list, and updates will be shared as the process moves forward.

The collaborative naming process — led with guidance from Tseshaht First Nation, Métis Nation BC, and the School District — has now been finalized. The chosen name is:

Zhenn Sayd – Young Cedar Early Learning Centre.

This name reflects the strength, resilience, and deep roots of children, families, and culture. The translation of Young Cedar in Nuuchah-nulth will be confirmed shortly, ensuring the name honours both Nuu-chah-nulth and Michif languages and worldviews.

This childcare facility represents a shared commitment to walk together in respect, partnership, and unity — creating a space where culture, learning, and family well-being come together.

Subject: Update on Childcare & Wickaninnish StrongStart

1. Background

The Pacific Rim School District continues to view early learning and child care as an integral part of the educational continuum — one that begins well before Kindergarten and is rooted in relationships, belonging, and community.

Through intentional partnerships and responsive program design, the district is working to strengthen the connections between early years programs and the K–12 system, ensuring that children and families experience a seamless and supportive transition into school.

Embedding child care within school communities provides far more than access to licensed spaces; it builds trusted relationships between families, educators, and schools, supports early identification and inclusion, and creates environments where every child can thrive.

Guided by the BC Early Learning Framework and the First Peoples Principles of Learning, the district's approach emphasizes:

- Collaborative, place-based partnerships with Indigenous partners and community organizations that honour culture, connection, and belonging;
- Continuity of relationships between early childhood educators, StrongStart educators, and Kindergarten teachers; and
- Collaborative transition practices that honour each child's learning journey and family context.

This work reflects a long-term commitment to building systems of care that are accessible, sustainable, and deeply connected to the places and people they serve — from StrongStart and Pop-Up Play to new child care partnerships across the region.

2. Maquinna Elementary - Métis Nation Childcare Project

The new Métis Nation child care facility, *Zhenn Sayd* – *Young Cedar Early Learning Centre*, continues to progress toward completion.

The collaborative naming process — led with guidance from Tseshaht First Nation, Métis Nation BC, and the Pacific Rim School District — has now been finalized. The chosen name, *Zhenn Sayd — Young Cedar Early Learning Centre*, reflects the strength, resilience, and deep roots of children, families, and culture. The Nuu-chah-nulth translation for "Young Cedar" will be confirmed shortly, ensuring the name honours both Nuu-chah-nulth and Michif languages and worldviews.

- Construction: Métis Nation BC has provided an updated schedule with a tentative occupancy target of November 14, 2025.
- Landscaping: Plans are expected to be approved by the Métis Nation Board of Directors in November, with work commencing in December 2025.
- Opening: The provincial project report reflects a March 1, 2026 opening date, dependent on operational readiness and selection of a licensed child care operator.

This project represents a strong partnership between Métis Nation BC, the Alberni-Clayoquot Métis Society, and the Pacific Rim School District, grounded in cultural responsiveness, inclusion, and community-based care.

4. Wood Elementary – Wood Child Care (Facility Name to be Determined)

Construction of the Wood Elementary child care facility is nearing completion, with the contractor's final completion date set for October 30, 2025.

The district continues to work with a non-profit childcare organization regarding the potential operation of this site. No agreement has yet been signed, as the organization is reviewing staffing feasibility, financial modeling, and operational capacity before confirming a commitment.

Preparations for licensing, furnishing, and setup are underway to support readiness for an early 2026 opening, pending operator confirmation and workforce capacity.

Workforce Considerations and Phased Opening

The ability to fully operate a 128-space child care centre is dependent on securing qualified Early Childhood Educators (ECEs).

The province-wide ECE workforce shortage continues to affect child care expansion across British Columbia, particularly in rural and remote regions. Despite competitive wages and benefits, recruiting certified ECEs — especially those with Infant/Toddler certification — remains a significant challenge.

Given these constraints, a phased opening approach may be necessary, with a limited number of rooms opening initially and expansion occurring as staffing permits.

5. Wickaninnish Community School – *taatna?aluk – Taking Care of Children* (Tofino)

The District of Tofino and the Board of Education of School District No. 70 (Pacific Rim) have entered into a signed License Agreement for the operation of the *taatna?aluk* – *Taking Care of Children* Childcare Centre at Wickaninnish Community School.

The District of Tofino plans to begin offering care on November 12, 2025, pending final licensing approval.

This phased model reflects the ECE workforce crisis, particularly the limited availability of Infant/Toddler-certified educators across in the region and the province. The District of Tofino is working proactively to recruit and train staff to expand programming as capacity allows.

We are excited to continue building on our strong partnership with the District of Tofino, which has been well established through Kindergarten transition work, early years collaboration, and community-based programming.

Having the District of Tofino operate *taatna?aluk – Taking Care of Children* onsite will strengthen family connections, support smoother transitions for children entering

Kindergarten, and ensure services that reflect shared values of community, inclusion, and belonging.

6. John Howitt Elementary Child Care Site

Following the initial Expression of Interest (EOI) process, no operator was selected for the John Howitt Elementary childcare space. Historically, due to local demographics and family enrolment patterns, the demonstrated need for on-site child care at this location has been low.

A second Expression of Interest has now been released and will remain open until a qualified operator is found. The district is exploring options to improve child care accessibility across the region, with the goal of supporting families equitably and maximizing the use of existing resources.

7. Wickaninnish StrongStart Programs Update

The StrongStart Educator position at Wickaninnish Community School remains vacant. Recruitment has been challenging due to several reasons, including the province-wide shortage of qualified early childhood educators, the limited hours allocated for the position under the Ministry of Education and Child Care's StrongStart funding model, and the high cost of living and limited housing availability in the Tofino area. The district is actively exploring options to support recruitment and program sustainability, with the goal of reinstating the program as soon as possible.

In the meantime, to maintain relationships and ensure continued connection with families, the Early Learning team has hosted a series of Pop-Up Play sessions this fall and will continue to do so until the position is filled. These sessions provide opportunities for families to gather, play, and learn together while preserving the strong community connections and early learning engagement that families in the community of Tofino have come to value.

8. Next Steps

- Continue coordination with Métis Nation BC on occupancy and landscaping completion at Maquinna.
- Finalize licensing and support the phased opening of *taatna?aluk Taking Care of Children* in Tofino.
- Continue operator discussions and licensing preparation for Wood Child Care (Port Alberni).
- Monitor ECE recruitment and support workforce development strategies, particularly Infant/Toddler certification pathways.
- Continue exploring creative staffing solutions to fill the Wickaninnish StrongStart position.
- Continue exploring options to enhance child care accessibility and family supports across the district.
- Prepare for anticipated early 2026 openings at Wood and Maquinna childcare centres.

I'm reaching out as a school psychologist in [Insert School District Name] to share an exciting opportunity to help shape the future of our profession and strengthen support for students across BC.

The University of British Columbia (UBC) is currently redeveloping its **Master of Education (MEd) in School Psychology program**, with plans to relaunch a **new intake in Summer 2027**. As you may know, this program has been paused for several years due to faculty shortages and uncertainty regarding the regulation of Licensed School Psychologists. With updated guidance from the College of Health and Care Professionals of BC (CHCPBC), UBC is now moving forward with a **hybrid delivery model** designed to expand access—particularly for rural, northern, and underserved districts like ours.

Why This Matters?

As you are aware, there is an ongoing **shortage of qualified school psychologists across BC**. Students with complex needs are waiting longer for assessments and interventions, and many districts continue to face challenges with recruitment, retention, and supervision capacity.

- As of June 2025, 18 Licensed School Psychologist positions were actively posted across BC (Make a Future).
- National guidelines recommend a ratio of 1 psychologist per 1,000 students—yet BC currently averages closer to 1:3,300.
- The **BCASP 2024 survey** noted that 16% of school psychologists plan to retire in 1–4 years, and only 35% are able to supervise interns.

In this fiscal climate, programs that

cannot clearly demonstrate measurable public impact risk being deferred or rejected. Our input could make the difference in whether or not this program moves forward.

How Our District Can Support?

UBC is seeking letters of support from school districts to help make this program viable. I would love to explore whether our district could provide a short letter that includes:

- General support for the redevelopment of the UBC MEd in School Psychology program
- Endorsement of the hybrid format to support workforce development across regions
- An estimate of current and anticipated staffing needs between now and 2030
- Our district's willingness to:
 - Offer practicum or internship placements
 - o Support a "Grow Your Own" model for local teachers/community members
 - o Provide release time or stipends for supervision, where feasible

Such a letter would go a long way in helping UBC demonstrate the provincial need and strengthen its case for funding and approval.

Why Now?

UBC's team is aiming to submit supporting materials—including letters like this—by **October 2025**. They are targeting a cohort size of 25–30 students every three years, which would directly contribute to the long-term sustainability of services in districts like ours.

Please let me know if you'd be open to supporting this request. I'd be happy to share a draft letter, set up a meeting, or connect you directly with the faculty leads.

Thank you for considering this. As someone who works every day with students, families, and educators in our district, I truly believe this program will make a difference.

Thank you for your letter of June 12, 2025, related to funding for Farm to School BC. I am responding on behalf of the Minister of Education and Child Care, the Honourable Lisa Beare, as the funding you referenced falls under the Ministry of Health. I apologize for the delayed response.

I appreciate the passion and commitment expressed in your letter. Farm to School BC has been a valued partner in helping young people connect to healthy, local food and in building stronger school communities. I recognize the impact these programs have had, not just in classrooms, but in fostering healthier habits, deeper knowledge of food systems, and stronger links to local producers.

As you may be aware, the <u>Minister of Health's mandate letter</u> includes working with the Minister of Finance to review all existing Ministry of Health programs and initiatives to ensure they support and continue to serve British Columbians within current budget realities. Unfortunately, this has meant that some programs which previously received year-end funding could not be supported this year. I want to assure you that this decision does not reflect a lack of appreciation for Farm to School BC or the value of its work.

The Province remains committed to supporting nutritious and sustainable school food programs. The Ministry of Education and Child Care provides \$71.5 million annually through the <u>Feeding Futures</u> program to create and expand school food initiatives. To complement this, the Ministry of Health launched the <u>BC School Food Toolkit</u> in March 2025 to help schools create and maintain supportive food environments. The Ministry of Agriculture and Food is also working with school districts and supply chain partners through <u>Feed BC</u>, encouraging local food use in Feeding Futures programs and building food literacy through classroom learning opportunities.

Together, these initiatives are designed to create a coordinated, cost-effective and sustainable framework for school food programming across BC. While year-end funding for Farm to School BC is not available at this time, I encourage schools in your district to continue accessing the program's classroom learning resources, which remain available online here: Farm to School BC - Bringing healthy, local food to schools K-12.

I recognize this is not the answer you were hoping for, and I want to reiterate that the lack of year-end funding for Farm to School BC in no way reflects a lack of appreciation for the program or the value of its work. Thank you again for your advocacy and for highlighting the importance of school food programs. Your voice, and the voices of school communities, are vital as we continue to strengthen the supports available to children and youth across the province.

3. PRESENATION

Mobile Seating Clinic Presentation – Dave Claver Consulting

- "Seating and Mobility solutions for those who want to get out there!"
- Bringing programs to Vancouver Island, helping people with wheelchairs and wheelchair users throughout the north island. Particularly in Indigenous communities.
- Vancouver Island has a massive gap between what people need and what is being provided. The goal is creating wheelchairs that will work from urban to rural communities.
- A Mobile Seating Clinic's goal would be to offer a service that can arrive at people's home, access to their lifestyle and community. To help them find the correct accommodation that is appropriate for them. Making sure the outcome is what they desire.
- Evaluation to find the individuals needs from a holistic approach and offering training and education to the wheelchair users. Making sure people have the range or skills to operate and thrive in their lives.
- The mobile seating clinic with offer follow up with the users, to make sure the client is satisfied and comfortable. Regular follow up is extremely important and is often not possible with our current health system.
- Would be ready to start in Spring of 2026. 4-year plan, with goals and training local physiotherapist to be able to continue this process and be successful. From now until the future.

Committee Member Comments:

- One issue seen with the presentation is that Dave is the main person developing this program and wanting to avoid the possibility of them burning out and then not being able finishing the program, leaving the community with nothing.
- Wanting to involve the Federal Government, all programs need to offer a rural services component, to help students and people get the experience working in these types of communities.
- Question: Is your non-profit registered in Canada? Answer: Yes BC registered.
- Changes in the funding within the province. Questions: Where do you apply for the grants? Answer: Local insurance – blue cross and Manulife, etc.)
 Question: How much does each wheelchair cost? Answer: Anywhere between \$4000-\$9000, once you start adding motors or posture components it becomes anywhere from \$18,000-\$40,000
- Trying to build a constant service from pediatric through all ages of life.

- Not yet finished with the peer sports training with ADAPS, few plans have been rescheduled due to illness and scheduling errors. Transportation also continues to be challenge. Hoping to have this finished by end of next week.

- Graduation will be next Thursday, as well as prom. Excited to celebrate our Youth.
- Medicine garden is planted and looking beautiful, the school's art program
 has had students create garden markers for the different plants.
- Aquaculture program on hold till September.
- Wrapping up imagination station art program, with some cultural beading
 Though the summer they will continue the after-school program to paint and
 decorate the Bamfield fisheries dock.
- Career Fair that was organized at the end of May, looking at career opportunity for youth and discussing/elevating youth voice to what is wanted for the future of the village to look like.
- School participated in nested moon ceremony. A gathering within the school district to perform and share their voices.
- Next week: Library game show literacy event, to encourage youth to continue library use throughout the summer. Grant through First Boos Program which allowed them to purchase books for every student.
- Queer Youth organized 3rd Annual LGBTQI+ Pride March for in beginning of July
- Plans to engage an informal harm reduction outreach work at Pachena Bay Music Festival. Encouraging Peer to Peer Support, creating support for the youth through the exciting event.
- Jomy taking over for Jaslyn and stepping into the role of Bamfield Community School Association Manager.
- Hired a summer camp facilitator, with Canada Summer Jobs Grant funding: responsible for planning and running summer day camps 3 days a week for ages 5-12
- Successful in a United Way School-Out Grant, for next year. This will provide 4 days a week of after school club, monthly field trips, plans to engage with NTC in these programs.
- Gearing up a fun and engaged summer.
